


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The Institute for Educational Leadership (IEL) has a long and distinguished history supporting communities to accelerate system change and expand educational and workforce opportunities for young people and their families. Through the Coalition for Community Schools, IEL is coordinating a national effort to expand Community Schools in urban, rural, and suburban communities. IEL provides national leadership to help build learning systems that unite communities, families, and schools to accelerate the improvement of student outcomes.

Community Schools are public schools that combine local resources and individuals to expand learning opportunities and support for all students. They serve as learning hubs that unite families, educators, and community partners around a strategy and the resources needed to promote equity-centered practices that improve long-term life changes of today's students. Community Schools are an effective and proven strategy for improving education while using culturally informed strategies that help all students reach their potential academically and in the future. There are currently an estimated 4,200 Community Schools across the United States, with that number growing quickly.

The Coalition for Community Schools is made up of **over 1,000 partners** across the country, and is supporting existing or developing Community School State Coalitions in **40 states and territories.**





What does the Coalition do?

- Convenes community members, families, advocates, and Community School practitioners to provide expertise on supporting students and families.
- <u>Provides professional development and technical assistance</u> to communities creating comprehensive systems of support grounded in a framework of collaborative leadership.
- Shares latest research and lessons learned for Community School planning, implementation, and scaling, and sustainability.
- Nurtures relationships to promote student and community success.
- Advocates for funding and legislative support of Community Schools at the federal and state level and beyond.

When these conditions are met:

High-quality core instruction with community resources to support instruction.

Students are motivated and engaged in learning before, during, and after school.

The basic physical, mental, and emotional health needs of young people and their families are recognized and addressed.

There is mutual respect and effective collaboration among parents, families, and school staff.

Community engagement that promotes a safe, supportive, and respectful school climate that connects students to a broader learning community.

These outcomes happen:

Student learning improves.

Parent and family participation in their children's education and in the school increases.

Principals and teachers have more time to focus on supporting quality instruction.

Families have more opportunities and support to engage in their student's academic journey.

Barriers to learning are decreased

What is needed to create more Community Schools:

- Leadership from across the community to provide the fuel and direction needed to start and sustain the work.
- Long-term, sustainable financing that taps into a diverse array of funding streams and ensures existing community resources are used as efficiently and effectively as possible.
- The organized and vocal support of constituents students, parents, and community residents – to keep community and school leaders focused on building support and getting results.
- Customized technical assistance and capacity building for collaborative leaders across the education field.
